

**The Burghley Challenge Cup** presented by the Sixth Marquess of Exeter will be awarded to the winning athlete.

**The Henry Tate Challenge** Cup presented by Sir Henry Tate, Bart, will be awarded to the owner of the second horse.

**The Sugden Challenge Trophy** presented by Miss Nora C. Sugden will be awarded to the athlete of the second horse.

**The Stamford Challenge Cup** presented by Stamford Town Council will be awarded to the owner of the third horse. A silver photo frame presented by Dawson of Stamford Ltd will be awarded to the athlete of the third horse.

**A miniature of the Land Rover Perpetual Challenge Trophy** presented by LAND ROVER will be awarded highest placed British Athlete, who is competing for the first time at Burghley.

A plaque will be awarded to all owners whose horse completes the competition and also to any athlete completing the competition who is not the owner of the horse.

Bouvet Ladubay will present a jeroboam of Sparkling Saumur to the winning athlete and a magnum to the athletes placed second and third.

Dege & Skinner of Savile Row will present a voucher for a Bespoke Riding Coat to the highest placed British Athlete who is under 25 on 1st January 2011 and who is not yet entitled to wear the adult Union Flag Badge.

Grandslam of eventing: a cash prize of \$350,000 will be awarded to the athlete who wins Kentucky CCI\*\*\*\* (USA) , Badminton CCI\*\*\*\* and Burghley CCI\*\*\*\* in any consecutive order regardless of the calendar year. Due to the re-scheduling of the Badminton/Kentucky dates in 2011 in order to be eligible to claim the Rolex Grandslam prize the winner of the 2010 Badminton Horse Trials will have to win the 2010 Burghley Horse Trials and the 2011 Kentucky 3DE (even though the 2011 Badminton Horse Trials takes place before the 2011 Kentucky 3DE.) The winner of the 2010 Burghley Horse Trials (if different from the winner of the 2010 Badminton 3DE) will have to win the 2011 Badminton Horse Trials and the 2011 Kentucky 3DE in order to win the Rolex Grandslam.

HSBC FEI Classics™ . Burghley is part of this series. Points won at each of the five 4-star events in the series go towards prizes for the athlete(s) with the most points over the year.

The HSBC FEI Classics™ Training Bursary - awarded to the highest placed athlete never to have completed at a 4 star level event prior to 1st January 2010. The training voucher to the value of \$1,000 with a trainer of the athletes choice approved by FEI and National Federation.

Sport Horse Breeding of Great Britain will present a bronze and rosette to the owner of the highest placed horse sired by an SHB (GB) Graded Stallion or HIS Premium Stallion, provided it finishes in the first twelve places.

Twemlows Hall Stud Farm will award a scholarship for two embryos to the highest placed British bred or domiciled mare completing the competition providing it is placed in the top 20. Details of the scholarship are available from richardmatson@twemlows.co.uk

The Supporters of British Breeding will present a £1,000 prize to the Breeder of the highest placed British Bred Horse providing it finishes in the first six places.

The Worshipful Company of Farriers will award a rosette and a plaque to the owner of the "best shod horse", and a plaque to the registered farrier responsible for its feet and shoeing. Judging will take place during the First Horse Inspection on Wednesday, 2 September.

£350 expenses will be paid to every owner whose horse completes the competition without winning a prize and £50 will be awarded to the groom in charge of each horse that starts the Cross Country Test.

All cups and trophies are presented on an annual basis and must be returned for presentation the following year.

## VI. REGISTRATION OF ATHLETES & HORSES

**All Athletes & horses participating in any International Eventing competition must be registered with the FEI. (Gen. Rules Art. 113, Art. 511.1 and 511.2)**

### 1. QUALIFICATIONS

Each NF must certify the qualification of each horse and athlete and list the competitions which enabled horse and athlete to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level. Please include the relevant procedure according to level of event in schedule (refer to Part B attached and Rules for Eventing Art. 506).

- 2. ENTRIES** (Art. 121 & 510 & Annex 1 of this Check List for all information to be included on all starting lists and final results sheets). Athletes are entered by the Organising Committee through their NF (Art. 121.1 will apply)

**All athletes and horses participating in any International competition must be registered with the FEI. Any athlete and/or horse who is not registered with the FEI (at the start of the event) shall be automatically disqualified.**

**1. ATHLETES**

**British Athletes and Foreign Athletes Resident in the UK**

Accommodation: athletes caravans may be parked free of charge adjacent to the stables. The names and addresses of hire firms will be forwarded on application to any competitor wishing to hire a caravan. The Competition Secretary must be advised at the time of entry if a site is to be reserved for a caravan.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £60 will be given to each competitor, which may only be exchanged at the Stables Dining Room.

NO CARAVAN OR BEDDING WILL BE PROVIDED BY THE HORSE TRIALS.

**Overseas Athletes**

Accommodation: athletes are responsible for making their own arrangements. No expenses will be paid. However, an allowance of £400 will be paid to foreign athletes who are based overseas, if the horse is not normally stabled or competing in Great Britain and has travelled to the event from outside mainland Great Britain since 1st July 2010. (Maximum of 4 per Nation)

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £60 will be given to each competitor, which may only be exchanged at the Stables Dining Room.

TAX: prize money won by overseas athletes may be subject to deduction of UK Tax in accordance with Inland Revenue regulations.

**Note**

A **limited** number of electrical connections to horseboxes will be available, if prebooked at a cost of £35 (including VAT) for the duration of the event. Athletes must bring their own extension leads and no sharing of a supply is permitted (Connector required – 16amp CForm [male]).

**2. GROOMS**

**Grooms of British Athletes and Foreign Athletes Resident in the UK**

Grooms caravans may be parked free of charge adjacent to the stables. The names and addresses of hire firms will be forwarded on application to any competitor wishing to hire a caravan. The Competition Secretary must be advised at the time of entry if a site is to be reserved for a caravan.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £90 for the Stables Dining Room will be provided on the basis of one groom per horse.

**Grooms of Overseas Athletes**

Accommodation: shared caravan type accommodation is provided near the stables on a basis of one groom per athlete.

Food: meal vouchers to the value of £90 will be provided on a basis of one groom per horse.

NO BEDDING WILL BE PROVIDED BY THE HORSE TRIALS.

Medical, Veterinary Assistance etc: the services of a Doctor, Veterinary Surgeon and Farrier will be available but athletes must be responsible for paying any charges incurred.

### **3. HORSES / PONIES**

Stabling, bedding and forage will be provided free for horses for up to 5 days. Transport expenses to be paid by the athlete.

### **4. WELCOME**

## **WELFARE OF THE HORSE**

### **CODE OF CONDUCT**

#### **FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE**

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

1. *At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.*
2. *Horses and athletes must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.*
3. *Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.*
4. *Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.*
5. *The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.*

**1. EVENTING MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS OF ATHLETES & HORSES (Art. 506)** – *Please include relevant part for level and category of event*

Each NF must certify the minimum eligibility requirements of each horse and athlete and list the competitions which enabled horse and athlete to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level as laid out in Art. 506. Relevant level and criteria must be included in the schedule.

**1.1. Principles**

In order to compete at an international event, an athlete and horse must have obtained the minimum eligibility requirements at a number of events at a lower level.

The requirements are laid out below. With the approval of the FEI and their own NF, OCs may impose additional qualifications for horses and/or athletes, which must be published in the schedule.

**1.2. Minimum eligibility requirements**

The minimum eligibility requirements are achieved by completing a competition within minimum parameters of all round performance. As follows:

- Dressage Test: not more than 75 penalty points;
- Cross-Country Test:
  - From 2009 onwards, the results at obstacles at International events need to include, where applicable, a clear round (0 penalties) at obstacles for CIC events and maximum 20 penalties at a CCI;
  - Not more than 90 seconds exceeding the optimum time in the Cross Country. At 4\* events, the maximum time by which the optimum time may be exceeded is 120 seconds; and
- Jumping Test: not more than 16 penalties at obstacles.

**1.3. Certification of Qualification for Events**

1.3.1. All NFs, including the host nation, are responsible to certify that athletes and horses entered by them in international events are correctly qualified in accordance with all the requirements of the Rules.

1.3.2. All qualifying events must be identified, and any national events must be certified as of at least the equivalent standard of difficulty as the relevant international star level of competition.

1.3.3. The Technical Delegate or his nominee shall check that all horses and athletes starting at all International events are properly certified as qualified by their NF or duly exempted in accordance with this article.

**1.4. Qualifying Period and Deadline**

1.4.1 Minimum eligibility requirements for CIOs, CCIs and CICs must be obtained in the calendar year in question or the 2 preceding calendar years.

1.4.2 The Minimum Eligibility Requirement at a CCI must be obtained at least 24 days before the Cross Country test of the event for which it is needed; a Minimum Eligibility Requirement at a CIC must be obtained at least 10 days before the event for which it is needed.

1.4.3 Minimum eligibility requirements may be achieved as a combination or separately by athlete and horse.

1.4.4 Where a Minimum Eligibility Requirement at a CIC is specified, one Minimum Eligibility Requirement at a CCI of the same level is equally acceptable.

<b>4 *</b>	Minimum 3 MER required: 1x CCI 3* <u>plus</u> 1x CIC 3* <u>plus</u> 1x CIC 3* or 2x CNC 3*

**1.6 Exemptions CCIO/CCI/CIC**

Under exceptional circumstances, the FEI may before the event, with the agreement of the Organising Committee of a CCIO/CCI/CIC and the NF of the host country, waive the qualifying standard for a horse, but only at the specific written request of the athlete's NF. Such a request must be accompanied by the reasons for the request and a detailed summary of both the horse and athlete's performance record, including all the horse's competitions at national and international CIC Events and Three Day Events during the current and previous year. Such exemptions will be considered only for specific selection purposes for Championships/Games in the Minimum Eligibility Requirements year.

**1.7 Permanent Athlete Qualification for CCIs and CICs**

When an athlete has, since January 1st 2002, achieved 5 MER at a 4 or 3 star type of event, he can compete at that type/level (or lower) for life without further MER. Exception: Championships where MER must be achieved as a combination see above.

**NOTE:** CCIs count towards Permanent Qualification for CICs of the same level, but CICs do not count towards Permanent Qualification for CCIs of the same level. The horse ridden by a permanently qualified athlete must still fulfil the Minimum Eligibility standards.

**1.8 Establishment of Minimum Eligibility Requirements**

When the athlete obtains a MER at the higher level, then he and his horse are "established" (qualified to compete) at this higher level. This "establishment" lasts for the remainder of the year in which it was obtained and the 2 succeeding calendar years.

NOTE: Re-qualification is required when the 2 year period has run out

**1.9 Extension of Establishment (maintaining qualification Minimum Eligibility Requirements) for CCI**

**1.91. THE "ESTABLISHMENT"** may be extended by obtaining MER at other events of the same type and level within the 2 year period stated above, each extension remaining effective for the remainder of the calendar year and the 2 succeeding years. (see 1.8 above)

**1.9.2 WHEN ESTABLISHMENT** has expired for CCI, it can be renewed at any time with 2 clear rounds on cross country obstacles and fulfilment of Minimum Eligibility Requirements parameters as defined above for Dressage and Jumping (eg 2/3 year later) with 2 CIC/CNC of same level or higher during the 12 months before the event in question.

(To maintain the minimum requirement for 4star CCI, the establishment can be renewed with fulfilment of minimum requirements with 2 CIC/CNC at 3 star level.)

**3. VETERINARY ASPECTS / ISSUES**

**3.1 VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS**

These will be carried out in accordance with the "Veterinary Regulations", Art. 1011 & "Rules for Eventing" **Art. 518.1 for CCIs and 518.2 for CICs.**

### **Art. 511.2.2**

Every horse entered for any competition at CCNs, CICs 2/1\* or CCIs 2/1\* in a foreign country (GRs Art. 141.2), and all horses entered for CICs 3\*, CCIs 4/3\*, CCIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI and accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card and, when applicable, an FEI registration number, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

### **Art. 511.2.3**

Horses taking part in CCNs, CICs 2/1\* or CCIs 2/1\* in the country in which they are resident are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned Paragraph 2.2. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable and unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin, all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

**3.3 SAMPLING PROCEDURE FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES** (Vet. Regs, Ch. V & VI and Annex IV)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCIs 4/3\*, CCIOs, World Cup™ Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CCIs/CICs sampling is recommended. When testing takes place, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Vet. Regs. Art. 1016).

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

**3.4 MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME (GROUP I & II ONLY)**

The Organising Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.

**NEW 3.5 GROUPS I & II ONLY - MCP CENTRAL LABORATORY UPDATE 1<sup>st</sup> SEPTEMBER 2009**

Under the Medication Control Programme (MCP) in **Groups I and II**, all samples collected in accordance with Vet. Regs. Art. 1016 will be analysed by the **Horseracing Forensic Laboratories (H.F.L) Sport Science, Quotient Bioresearch Limited Newmarket Road Fordham, Cambridgeshire CB7 5WW**. For events other than those listed in Vet. Regs. Art. 1016 or for events other than in Groups I and II, samples may be analysed at an alternative FEI listed laboratory (Vet. Regs. Art. 1021).

**CUSTOM FORMALITIES & HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES**

## **4. CUSTOM FORMALITIES**

Details of required customs documents, border crossing points, times of opening and customs agencies.

NFs holding an international event in their country should inform their National Veterinary Authority and their Customs Authority at least four weeks beforehand. They should request every facility to assist the movement of horses accompanied by FEI Passports, and the necessary veterinary certification at frontier crossing points into and out of their countries. (Vet. Regs. Art. 1004.2)

Peden Bloodstock must be given the following information at least ten days prior to the arrival of horses of EU origin, and at least four weeks prior to the arrival of horses from outside the EU:

Information on all horses - EC and non-EC

- Name, age, colour, sex and FEI Passport Number
- Name and address of Owner and/or Athlete
- Address where the horse is resident
- Address to which the horse will return after the event
- Port of arrival in Great Britain
- Port of departure from Great Britain
- Registration number of the vehicle that the horse will travel in.

Horses from the EC Member States

All horses from EC nations must be accompanied by the official health certificate for travel within the Community; the certificate must show the FEI Passport Number, and the Passport must accompany the horse at all times. This certificate is not required for horses from Ireland or France.

Horses from outside the European Community

Horses from outside the EC must be accompanied by the health certificate appropriate to their country of origin; details of the correct certificate and of any blood tests which may be needed can be obtained from the official Transport Agents. This certificate will allow the horse to remain in the EC for a maximum of 90 days; should the competitor intend to keep his horse in Britain longer than that, then Peden Bloodstock will provide details of the permanent health certificate including information on the blood tests and pre-export isolation which may apply.

As DEFRA has to be advised well in advance of the arrival of horses from outside the EC, it is important that full details of travel plans are provided to Peden Bloodstock at least four weeks prior to arrival.

Customs Documentation

Horses from outside the EC must arrive with an ATA Carnet issued in the country of origin, to cover the horse and its accompanying equipment. Should any horse travel without an ATA Carnet then either the National Federation or the competitor concerned will be responsible for the costs in connection with temporary import into the EC.

British Export Welfare Regulations

Special Export Licences are required for every horse leaving the country; these are issued by DEFRA and Peden Bloodstock will obtain them providing the essential information is supplied at least ten days before the start of the event. These documents are provided at the competitor's expense.

As EC Regulations and Animal Welfare during transport are constantly under review and may be altered at any time, any queries on this subject should be addressed to Peden Bloodstock Ltd who will do their best to provide the relevant information. If any major changes do come into effect after the entry date then Peden Bloodstock will endeavour to contact each competitor or their Federation direct.

Export Health Certificates – where applicable

Peden Bloodstock will arrange for a health certificate to be issued to the veterinary surgeon at the event for each horse to return to its origin, provided the essential information on the return travel plans is given to them a minimum of ten days before the start of the event.

The veterinary surgeon will complete this health certificate at the competitors' expense.

PLEASE NOTE that the Organising Committee will not be responsible for any taxes or fines which may be due if any horse or equipment does not return to its country of origin at the end of the event. Should any claim be made against the Organising Committee for any taxes or fines on horses or equipment which have remained in Great Britain or the European Union the National Federation making the entry will be responsible for paying these.

## **5. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES**

## **6. MISCELLANEOUS**

### **6.1. OBJECTIONS/COMPLAINTS (Art. 166)**

All complaints to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150 or equivalent.

### **6.2. DEDUCTIONS FROM PRIZE MONEY**

Prize money won by overseas athletes will be subject to deduction of UK Tax in accordance with Inland Revenue regulations.

### **6.3 EVENTING MEDICAL CARD (Annex 7 "Rules for Eventing")**

Athletes must carry readily accessible on themselves a medical card for the Cross-Country Test. This card must be handed over for examination on arrival at the Event where it will be checked by the Official Doctor and the Technical Delegate for accurate information.

### **6.4. INSURANCES**

"All owners and athletes are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out a third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad and to keep the policy up to date".

### **6.5 EVENT'S ORGANISATION (Art. 114 & 115)**

The OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. All modifications made to the schedule must have the approval of the FEI Secretary General.

### **6.6 ENTRY RIGHT TO SHOWGROUNDS**

Vehicle Passes and Badges

Competitors' Passes: each athlete will be issued with three vehicle passes and three security wristlets for access to the stable compound. No trainers passes will be issued and athletes are responsible for passing on one of their vehicle passes to their trainer if they wish. In addition, each competitor will be issued with one horsebox parking permit. **For health and safety reasons, the registration number of all horseboxes and an emergency contact number for the person responsible on the showground, will be required in advance for the preparation of the permit.** This permit will be issued on arrival at the Event and **MUST** be displayed on the windscreen of the horsebox at all times.

Owners' Passes: one vehicle pass and two security wristlets will be issued to each owner recorded in the horse's FEI Passport (up to a maximum of 3 owners per horse).

Family/Extra Grooms, etc: application for additional security wristlets for access to the stable compound must be made at time of entry and each application will be decided on its merits (a maximum of two per horse will be issued). Separate passes will be available for family members who require access to the stables area but NOT the stable compound. These passes are for internal use between the show area and stable fields and will not gain entry to the showground.

## 6.7 STABLE

Arrival time and stabling

No horse will be permitted to enter the Stables prior to 09.30 hours on Tuesday, 31 August, except with prior arrangement.

All horses entered in the Event must arrive no later than 09.30 hours on Wednesday, 1 September, to permit the First Examination to take place prior to the First Inspection.

Thereafter no horse may leave the competition site before the end of the Event, unless it is eliminated, withdrawn or otherwise retired from the competition.

## 6.8 DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY

Save for the death or personal injury caused by the negligence of the Organisers or anyone for whom they are in law responsible, neither the Organisers of The Land Rover Burghley Horse Trials, British Eventing Limited, the British Equestrian Federation, the Trustees of the Burghley Estate, nor any agent, employee, or representative of these bodies accepts any liability for any accident, loss, damage, injury or illness to horses, owners, athletes, grooms, spectators, land, cars, their contents and accessories or any other person or property whatsoever, whether caused by their negligence, breach of contract or in any other way whatsoever. Further, the Organisers reserve the right to refuse admission to Burghley Park to any person or to withdraw permission at any time to remain in the Park, and shall not be required to give any reason for such action. The Committee shall not be liable in respect of any loss or damage whatsoever arising from abandonment, cancellation or postponement of The Land Rover Burghley Horse Trials, or any such eventuality.

## 6.9 PHOTOGRAPHIC RIGHTS

Competitors give the absolute right and permission for any photographic and/or film or video or TV footage taken of persons or horses taking part in the event to be used and published in any media whatsoever for editorial purposes, press information or advertising by or on behalf of the Event and/or the Event's official sponsors.

## 6.10 INTERNATIONAL PAIRS CHALLENGE

An additional competition will be held within the CCI\*\*\*\*. After the First Horse Inspection, the top fifteen highest ranked 'British' athletes competing at Burghley, will be paired with the top fifteen 'rest of the world' athletes competing at Burghley as follows, the no 1 ranked British athlete will be paired with the no 15 'rest of the world' athlete, the no 2 ranked British athlete will be paired with the no 14 'rest of the world' athlete etc. Rankings will be taken from the FEI published table as of the 30 August 2010.

The pairs' competition scores will be added together and placing calculated as under the FEI Rules for Scoring. Prize money will be awarded to the top three placed pairs as follows:

1st Prize	£2,500	(£1,250 each)
2nd Prize	£1,000	(£500 each)
3rd Prize	£500	(£250 each)

## 6.8 RESULTS

In order to proceed with the results publication for qualification purposes, the FEI requires results to be sent in immediately after the conclusion of the event. Please refer to compulsory format for CCIs and CICs. Results to be sent by e-mail to [fabienne.diserens@fei.org](mailto:fabienne.diserens@fei.org), preferably on Excel file immediately after the event. All results must include FEI Passport Registration number of horses. **All athletes who have not completed the event must appear on the results sheets.** Exact distance of the Cross-country course must be included on result sheet.

**STABLE SECURITY/STEWARDSHIP AT INTERNATIONAL EVENTS**  
**Minimum requirements to ensure implementation of Veterinary Regulations,**  
**Art.1005.2 – SEE ALSO ANNEX 13 EVENTING RULES**

**1. ACCESS TO STABLE AREA**

For an optimal stable security, the stables must be completely enclosed within a suitably restrictive perimeter (stable area) which will act both as a deterrent to the admission of unauthorised persons and to the exit of horses. The area must be sufficiently large to allow horses to be evacuated from the stables in an emergency but still remain within the confines of the perimeter. However, several disciplines allow in specific situations a lower level of stable security (see discipline rules).

Whenever possible the stable area must include only stables; lorries, caravans, etc., should not be permitted within the area unless specifically needed as accommodation for horses and/or grooms.

Access to stables must be limited to those persons indicated in VRs Art. 1005.2.5.3. It is essential that the official issuing authorised access be a responsible person of seniority within the OC.

**2. CONTROL OF ACCESS**

A control system must operate at all entrance gates so that there is an efficient and reliable method of identifying those who enter and leave the stable area at any time.

Extra vigilance must be used in establishing the identity of persons and reasons for entering the stables during the night.

**3. STEWARDING OF STABLE AREA**

At least one stable steward, directly responsible to the Chief Steward, must be present or readily available in the vicinity of the stable area 24 hours a day during the entire duration of the event. He may be assisted by deputies as required. The steward/deputies must regularly patrol the stable area, without establishing any predetermined pattern, to discourage any form of illegal practices or abuses to horses. Any misdemeanours must be reported immediately to the stable steward who must, in turn, report to the Chief Steward.

The duty of the stewards is therefore to safeguard the welfare of the horses and to prevent any form of illegal practices.

**4. GROOMS**

It is appreciated that grooms wish to remain with their horses during the night. Only grooms duly registered with the OC are permitted to do so.

The Person Responsible must ensure that his/her grooms, or any other authorised persons with access to his/her horses, are familiar with the security and stewarding procedures operating at the event attended.

**5. MOVEMENT THROUGHOUT EVENT GROUNDS**

Movement of horses between the stables, practice, grazing and main arena must be strictly controlled. The optimum layout for Jumping and Dressage disciplines is attached. It is appreciated that flexibility will be required depending on the requirements of other disciplines.

**6. STEWARDING OF PRACTICE ARENA**

The Chief Steward must ensure that all practice arenas are adequately stewarded all the time that they are officially open. He must also ensure that these arenas are subject to random control when they are officially closed.

**7. GRAZING AREA**

It is recommended that a grazing area be provided at all outdoor events, and that this be subject to random control. If available, horses must only be grazed or walked in hand within this area.

The Foreign Judge/TD at events will be specifically asked to check that the relevant requirements are met as reasonably as can be expected, depending on the discipline, and to indicate clearly any shortfalls, following which consideration may be given to altering the category of the event in future.
